Early Years Pupil Premium (EYPP) was introduced in April 2015, nurseries, schools, childminders and other childcare providers have been able to claim extra funding through the **Early Years Pupil Premium** to support children's development, learning and care.

The Early Years Pupil Premium provides an extra £8 per week for three and four-year old children whose parents are in receipt of certain benefits or who were formerly in local authority care but who left care because they were adopted or were subject to a special guardianship or child arrangements order. Research has shown that these children are more likely to under achieve, therefore EYPP funding is specifically used to make sure they reach their full potential in the early years.

The funding is allocated to individual schools to fund children who access nursery education from low income families. The purpose the extra funding will help us to 'close this gap' between the lowest achieving children and those who are making age appropriate progress or above

This means an extra £304 a year for each child taking up the full 570 hours funded entitlement to early education. We can use the extra funding in any way we choose to improve the quality of the early years education that we provide.

It is well documented that high quality early education can influence how well a child does at both primary and secondary school so we do want to make the most of this additional funding. Pupil premium has been available for school-age children for a number of years and it has proved to have given a real boost to the children receiving the funding. We want to do the same for our early years children entitled to this funding.

At Oxhill we decided to use EYPP funding to compliment the work that is going on in school to close the “word gap” by focussing on areas of life skills where some children need a boost in independence skills or self confidence in order for them to thrive and achieve across all areas of learning. Enriching opportunities including, cookery, shopping, life skills and support for developing personal care. These activities will provide a range of opportunities for all children to try something new and shine.
